A message from Rev. Aaron Moad

Living in the Upside-Down Kingdom

Today I would like to share some thoughts on a powerful and challenging passage of Scripture, Jesus' 'Sermon on the Plain' also known as 'The Beatitudes' in **Luke 6:17-26**—it is a message that turns everything we know upside down.

In this passage, Jesus makes a series of shocking statements:

- The poor are blessed.
- The hungry will be filled.
- Those who weep will laugh.
- The persecuted will be honoured.

And in contrast:

- The rich will be deprived.
- The full will go hungry.
- Those who laugh now will weep.
- The praised will be rejected.

At first glance, these words don't make sense. **How can poverty be a blessing? How can hunger lead to satisfaction?** Yet, this is the radical message of Jesus—the announcement of **the upsidedown kingdom.**

1. True Blessing Is Found in Dependence on God

The world tells us that blessing comes from wealth, success, and comfort. But Jesus says true blessing is found in **dependence on God.** The poor, the hungry, and the broken hearted know they need Him. Their emptiness creates space for His fullness.

If we are honest, self-sufficiency can be a spiritual danger. When life is easy, we may forget how desperately we need God. But Jesus invites us to **live with open hands, trusting Him completely.**

What are you depending on today? Are you depending on finances, status, or comfort? Or are you depending on God alone?

2. The World's Values Are Not God's Values

Jesus warns that the things the world celebrates—wealth, comfort, and popularity—can be stumbling blocks to true faith. Why? Because they **create a false sense of security.**

It is not wrong to have resources, but if our trust is in **what we own rather than in the One who provides,** we are in danger of loving wealth, status and comfort more than God or our neighbour.

God's kingdom operates by different values. In His economy:

- The greatest are the least.
- The humble are admired.
- The weak are made strong.

Are we living by God's values or the world's?

3. Following Jesus Means Embracing a Different Way of Life Jesus tells us that following Him will not always be easy. In fact, it may bring rejection, suffering, or loss. But He also promises that those who endure will receive a far greater reward than this world could ever offer, His presence.

Many Christians throughout history have given up comfort, security, and even their lives to follow Jesus. Why? Because they knew that what they gained in Christ was far greater than what they lost.

The world may call us foolish for choosing faith over fortune, humility over power, and service over status. But we do not live for this world—we live for the Kingdom of God.

Will You Embrace the Upside-Down Kingdom? The question we us today is this: Will we embrace the values of

Christ's kingdom, even when they seem upside down?

- Will we trust in God rather than in material wealth?
- Will we live by His values instead of chasing the world's approval?
- Will we stand firm in faith, even when it costs us?

Jesus calls us to something greater than earthly success—He calls us to **a life of eternal significance.** May we have the courage to follow Him, no matter the cost.
